September 21, 2023

The Umpqua Community College Board of Education had a regular meeting on Thursday, September 21, via Zoom conferencing; the meeting was live-streamed on YouTube. Board Chair Loosley called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m.

Citizen Comments: There were no comments.

The consent agenda was approved by general consent. The items are attached to the permanent minutes.

Changes to the Agenda: There were no changes.

REPORTS

- President's Report Rachel Pokrandt, Ph.D.: Fall term begins on Monday and students will be on campus. The College is in the midst of Kick Off Week with many different sessions. Keynote speaker Dr. Donna Beegle focused on the poverty crisis and its outcomes. Faculty had a retreat at the Big K Ranch. Currently, FTE is showing a 5% increase from last year; the final numbers will be available in 3-4 weeks. Programs showing large enrollment jumps are Dental Assisting, Certified Nurse Assistant, and Theatre Arts. Wolf Creek Job Corps continues to increase their enrollment with a goal of full capacity, 190 students, by the end of the year. Their education department was recently voted as the best department. There have been 174 students moved into UCC housing over the past two weeks. The College will have 230 athletes this year. Further information was shared regarding the new grants in Resolutions 4 & 5. Robynne Wilgus received the U-Rock award; an internal award passed around from employee to employee when amazing things are done. Coming up on Nov. 5 is the 7th annual Legacy Ball hosted by the UCC Foundation. On Sept. 28 will be the UCC Day of Service and Remembrance. A written report is on the website.
- Chair's Report Steve Loosley, Chair: There was no report.

OLD BUSINESS - There was none.

NEW BUSINESS

Natalya Brown, Chief Financial Officer, requested Board approval of Resolution #6, Approval of Contract Award for the Design Phase of Design-Build Housing Project, to award the contract to Guion Randol Contracting for the Design-Build Housing Project as advertised by Request for Proposal S-P00590-00007495. The College is requesting an approval for the contract award in the amount of \$380,000 for the design phase of the \$4,000,000 project. The RFP selection process was shared. Once the design phase is completed a contract will be brought to the Board for their approval of construction. Discussion explained there is a desire for the project to proceed as fast as possible, the College will be in lock-step with the contractor to be sure each part of the project is done within the budget, and \$380,000 is the negotiated price for the design phase.

MOTION: I move to approve Resolution No. 6, as presented. Motion by Dir. Littlejohn, seconded by Dir. Lydon, and unanimously approved.

Subject: Resolution #7, Increase Appropriation Date: October 11, 2023

This is a resolution to increase appropriation in the Special Revenue Fund – Grants & Contracts.

UCC has received three new awards from the State of Oregon.

Two-year STEAM HUB Backbone award (first year \$200,000)

The Backbone grant provides funding that allows the Umpqua Valley STEAM Hub (UVSH) to operate and serve Douglas County. It covers salaries, materials for our Lending Library, professional development supplies for educators, and other costs associated with serving the community. Lending Library includes introductory coding tools and various Legos and robotics.

Two-year STEAM Innovation award (first year \$213,950)

The Innovation grant provides funding for the UVSH to provide inspiring, engaging, and authentic STEAM learning experiences for youth in Douglas County, preparing them for future careers and a meaningful future. Four major areas that the STEAM Hub is involved in are: Core STEAM, Pathways to STEAM, Early STEAM, and Community STEAM.

Three-year Future Ready Workforce Innovation award (first year 378,752)

UCC received notice of award from Higher Education Coordinating Commission's Workforce Ready Round 2 grant, in the amount of \$1,007,226. For the next three years, this grant will fund some of the costs tied to our Allied Health program expansion including curriculum development and a specialized tutor for healthcare students. The highlight of the grant is our partnership with Aviva Health and the launch of a new Earn to Learn program, which we are calling E2L.

We will pilot E2L over the next three years, selecting 8 students per year (a total of 24 students) in some of our healthcare programs to participate. Selected participants receive paid tuition and fees, a small living stipend, and a guaranteed paid job at Aviva Health once they graduate.

Aviva will receive a small subgrant from UCC to administer their end of the partnership.

UMPQUA COMMUNITY COLLEGE Resolution No. 7 - FY 23-24 Increase Appropriation and Approval to Spend

WHEREAS, Umpqua Community College received three new awards totaling \$797,702 from the

State of Oregon.

WHEREAS, the provisions of ORS 294.338 (2) allow for the expenditure of specific purpose grants;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

that the Board of Education at Umpqua Community College hereby adopts this resolution for the grant expenditures in the amount of \$413,950 to continue serving Douglas County through the Umpqua Valley STEAM Hub and \$378,752 to continue expansion of the Allied Health Programs and to partner with Aviva Health to launch an Earn to Learn program.
